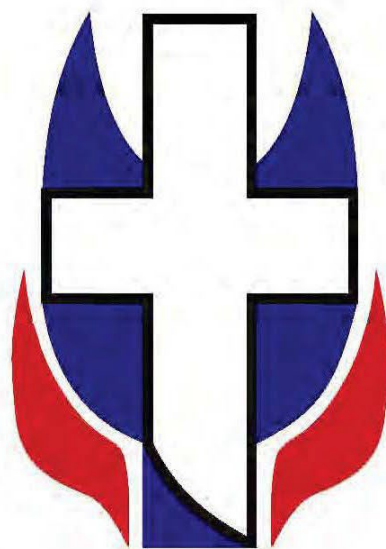

REPORT TO THE 2026 EXECUTIVE COMMISSION

MEMBERSHIP

TERMS OF REFERENCE

The following are the Terms of Reference for the ABC:

- a) To organise meetings of the General Assembly and Executive Commission.
- b) To draw up the agenda for the General Assembly and the Executive Commission.
- c) To formulate the Standing Orders of the General Assembly and the Executive Commission.
- d) To taking responsibility for the conduct the business of the General Assembly and Executive Commission.
- e) To ensure communication and implementation of decisions of General Assembly and Executive Commission.
- f) To attend to matters that may arise between the sitting of General Assembly and Executive Commission.
- g) To ensure the preservation of the UPCSA's organizational memory (Repository) as drawn from the decisions of the General Assembly and Executive Commission.

SET GOALS FOR THE ABC 2025- 2027

- To make a success of the Executive Commission 2026 which is being hosted by Central Office and the Presbytery of Highveld.
- To support and monitor the preparations for the General Assembly 2027.
- To distribute the Papers of General Assembly 2027 and the Executive Commission 2026 timeously, and ensure implementation of its decisions, through Committees of GA, Presbyteries and congregations.
- To ensure that there was support offered to the Moderator and his team during the periods between sittings of General Assembly and Executive Commission.
- To assist Cluster Co-ordinators with their role and work in the denomination, offering resources and support.
- To continue to add to the virtual repository of all the decisions taken by the General Assembly and Executive Commissions.

COMMITTEE STRUCTURE AND MEMBERSHIP

The new structure and introduction of the Cluster Co-ordinators is now 4 years in. The Cluster Co-ordinators are members of this committee. The ABC works closely with the Cluster Co-ordinators, in assisting and supporting them with their work, as their work contributes to the life and work of the General Assembly. In our meetings, we have been able to check on the work of the different committees and assist when problems arise. So far this has been beneficial, and we strive to continue to bring this new structure to its full potential.

Challenges

During the course of this year, the Committee was informed about the 2 Committees which have not managed to submit any reports neither have meetings. This was due to reasons which were beyond the control of the Conveners. These are the Stewardship and People with Disability Committees. The ABC therefore requests that the Nominations Committee appoint Interim Conveners to lead these 2 equally important committees of the church.

STANDING ORDERS

The ABC continues to fine-tune elements of the Standing Orders, as we learn new lessons and find better ways of conducting our business. The committee considers this document to be a living document that needs to be adjusted to fit the context of the meeting and decision making in the UPCSAs.

ORIENTATION & PROCEDURES

The Orientation booklet was sent out to all commissioners, which outlines the meeting format of the Executive Commission as a church council. We encourage all commissioners to familiarize themselves with the new way we are meeting, which uses the widget. The ABC undertook to set 2 online meetings to help orientate commissioners in preparation for the Executive Commission meeting. These were held on Wednesdays 27th May and on the 3rd of June 2026.

We endeavour to make sure everyone was familiar as to how the sessions would look and feel. We also did a test run of the Widget that was created, in order for commissioners to show their cards (orange or blue) while building consensus, further, we also talked through how commissioners would be able to indicate if they wanted to speak using the widget. We were determined to make this sitting of the Executive Commission a success, which meant that each and every commissioner was important to us, and their ability to participate was pivotal.

We have 4 Insaka groups that have been created for Executive Commission, each with around 10 participants, selected randomly. Each Insaka group has a facilitator and a scribe that have been elected from the group.

This meeting will use the Formal majority model of decision-making during the first Executive session and then the rest shall be under the Consensus decision-making Model. We wish to encourage all commissioners to ensure that they attend all the sessions of the consensus model namely the **Listening Sessions**, the **Insaka Sessions**, and the **Decision Sessions**.

All the proceedings of this Executive Commission shall be recorded and stored on the UPCSAs' created cloud-based repository; this is in keeping with the 2018 General Assembly decision.

ADOPTION OF THE PROPOSED AGENDA

The preliminary Draft agenda was sent to all commissioners with the Executive Commission papers. If you have not attended a GA/ExCom meeting for some time, you will note that the agenda has some major differences compared to previous agendas, as we are using the cluster model with the committees of General Assembly. The reports are now being given in accordance with the cluster that the committee is a member of.

We are hoping that this will make it easier for commissioners and delegates, as we discuss committees that are doing similar or even overlapping work.

Each day will start and end with Devotions, as we centre ourselves in God's presence and Spirit, these are of vital importance as we embark on making good and sound decisions about the work and future of the denomination, and its presence in the world.

DECISIONS OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

The decisions of the General Assembly 2025 were circulated to all Committees of GA, Presbyteries and congregations. Meetings were held with the Cluster Co-ordinators and Conveners of GA Committees, to alert them to the decisions and to request that they would attend to the matters that were related to their work. This is an ongoing process.

EXECUTIVE COMMISSION 2026

Our grateful thanks to the Highveld Presbytery for hosting this Executive Commission. They have gone beyond and done more than we asked for. From providing information, transport, meals, special requests all done with so much precision and humility. We say thank you to all who have contributed and supported this meeting.

IN MEMORIAM MINUTES

IN MEMORIAM FOR THE REV MATOROFA MUTONGANAVO

Rev. Matorofa Mutonganavo was born on 14 July 1974 at Morgenster Mission. He was the second born in a family of five children. He did his primary education at Murambwi Primary School and later attended Mapanzure Secondary School.

After completing his education, he worked as a teacher at Zimcare Trust, where he taught Building and Carpentry. During his time in Masvingo, he became a member of the Masvingo Congregation. It was there that he answered God's call into ministry and candidated in 1994. He went for theological training and completed his studies in 1997. He later did his probation in Kuwadzana Congregation for 2 years and completed in 1999, and was ordained into the ministry in the year 2000.

Rev. Mutonganavo married Angela Tadzembwa, and together they were blessed with three children, two boys and one girl. He loved his family deeply and remained committed both to his home and to the work of God. He served faithfully at St. Peter's Congregation for 13 years before moving to Gloag School and Congregation in 2014, where he ministered for 10 years. In every congregation he served, he became known for his dedication, humility, and passion for ministry.

Beyond the local congregation, Rev. Mutonganavo served the Church in many capacities. He became Convener of CDP, now known as Mission and Discipleship, where he worked in training evangelists and strengthening the Church's mission work. He also contributed greatly to the area of Church in Society as the convener.

From 2014 to 2016, he served as the Moderator of the Presbytery of Zimbabwe. During his term, he was also a member of the Executive Committees of the Zimbabwe Council of Churches, where he faithfully represented the UPCSA in various ecumenical efforts, including involvement with the UTC and Christian Care. At the time of his passing, Rev. Mutonganavo was ministering at the Masvingo Congregation. He remained dedicated to his ministry until his last days.

Today, we thank God for the life of a faithful servant who gave himself fully to the work of the Gospel. Rev. Mutonganavo dedicated his life to preaching, teaching, shepherding God's people, and serving the Church with commitment and humility.

Though his passing has come as a shock to many, we take comfort in knowing that his life touched many people and his work will continue to speak for generations to come. May his soul rest in eternal peace.

IN MEMORIUM MINUTES OF THE LATE REV. M.C MAFOKOANE

The late Reverend **MALEMELA CHARLIE MAFOKOANE**, is the son of the late Monnana Simon Mafokoane and Mmapula Dorah Mafokoane, was born on the 13th of July 1969 in Ga – Maja Koppermyn in the Province of Limpopo.

CALL INTO MINISTRY OF WORD AND SACRAMENT

The Rev M.C Mafokoane received his call into ministry early in his life, though he initially wanted to be a teacher, but the zeal that God had placed in his heart to serve Him propelled him to respond to Gods call in early 90's. After being discerned into the Ministry of Word and Sacrament he then went to commence with the Theological studies. Upon completion of his studies, he was then ordained as a Minister of Word and sacrament, and ever since he never looked back and served God until he met his death.



EDUCATION

He completed his foundation phase at Mokhopho primary and the senior phase studies at Ditsepu High School. He then furthered his studies at Durban Westville University, where he obtained a Bachelor's in Theology. He then proceeded to study teaching at Sebokeng College of education where he was conferred with a Diploma in Senior Phase Teaching. Years later he advanced his studies at Northwest University, where he was conferred with an Honours Bachelor of Education.

MARRIAGE

He was united in holy matrimony to Thandiwe Violet Mafokoane on the 1st of May 1999. The union was blessed with two children, Chegofatjo and Tumisho.

MINISTRY WORK

He served the Uniting Presbyterian Church in Southern Africa as an ordained Minister of Word and Sacrament. He started as an Interim Moderator at St Andrews in Sebokeng, within the bounds of the Presbytery of Lekoa (Then Orange Vaal). He then served different congregations within the bounds of the Presbytery of Tran-Xhariep where he spent the most part of his ministry. He received appointments as the Moderator of the Session at the following congregations: Zamdela + Koppies from 2000-2004; Tšoane Abraham Poho in Heilbron from 2005-2019, during the course of his service there, he built a church. Then, from 2020 until the time of his passing, he served at Abner Rabaitsile Poho in Dennewysville, together with Peniel in Sasolburg.

CIRCULAR WORK

The late Rev Mafokoane was a teacher at heart. This was shown by his desire to make a difference in the development of the African child. He went to study Education and was later appointed as a Mathematics teacher at Pele ya Pele Secondary from 2002. until the time of his passing.

The Rev 'Charlie' Mafokoane as affectionately called by his wife will be remembered for his humble and assertive character accompanied by the servanthood leadership that he portrayed his entire life. The Presbytery of Trans-Xhariep will always miss his excellent skills in being the Ministry Convener and producing few ministers under his guidance. We are certain that God will receive him with the following words, 'Well done my good and faithful servant! You have been faithful with a few things; I will put you in charge of many things. Come and share your Master's happiness' (Matthew 25:23). God is not ashamed to be called his God for He has prepared a resting place for him.

He leaves behind his wife, two children, mother, siblings, nieces and nephews.

OVERTURES AND PETITIONS

PETITION 1

INTENT TO FORM NEW PRESBYTERIES AND A SYNOD

BACKGROUND

In 2015, the following decision was made by the UPCSA:

The Executive Commission accepts and supports the request by the Presbytery of Zimbabwe for the deferment of the implementation of the General Assembly decision of establishing two Presbyteries until the Presbytery of Zimbabwe gives a lead on the matter.

Since that Executive Commission decision in 2015, the Presbytery of Zimbabwe has been working to figure out the best way to organize our UPCSA structures in Zimbabwe. The best way is perceived as one that would strengthen growth by facilitating the mission and ministry of the church effectively as well as strengthening the unity of the UPCSA within and beyond Zimbabwe. There have been a number of significant developments in that regard over the last ten years. These include:

Mission Enabling Commissions

After the 2015 decision the Presbytery of Zimbabwe divided itself into three geographical Districts, and appointed special Commissions such that each District is led by a Mission Enabling Commission made up of all Ministers and Presbytery Commissioners from the District.

The objective of setting these Districts up was to see if they can become Presbyteries. The Mission Enabling Commissions were granted some powers to enable them to oversee some of the life and work of the churches in their Districts. These delegated powers were mainly in the execution of the mission and ministry of the church in the relevant Districts with the Presbytery retaining judicial powers.

These Districts and their Mission Enabling Commissions were reviewed over the years as they were required to present Reports to the Ordinary meetings of the Presbytery. Important information was obtained from the reviews on the life and work of the Mission Enabling Commissions that oversee the geographical Districts. Key information includes:

- a) Geographical expanse of each of the three Districts remains too vast for effective interactions by congregations. Long distances did not only stifle interactions by congregations, but they also affected the life of the various church Fellowships. It was observed that the cost of travel to meetings of the Mission Enabling Commissions was too high in terms of both money and time such that meaningful participation by members was hampered.
- b) Each of the Districts ended up organizing congregations into smaller Clusters that were effective for carrying out mission and ministry together. In all three Districts, the Mission Enabling Commissions reported that members find energy in more localized programs that are carried out by congregations at Cluster level
- c) Growth of the UPCSA in Zimbabwe is slowed down by negative aspects such as tribalism, dependency syndrome, lack of appreciation of contextual issues caused by lopsided transnationally binding decisions and policies as well as lukewarm spirituality.

Significant growth areas

Since the 2015 decision of the Executive Commission the Presbytery of Zimbabwe has seen a remarkable increase in the number of ordained ministers. One of the challenges that had been observed in trying to implement the decision of establishing two Presbyteries in Zimbabwe was that there were very few ministers in the country at that stage. The number of ministers has trebled since then.

The other development is that since 2015 we have seen a considerable increase in the number of congregations constituted in the Presbytery. We have close to ten new congregations that have been constituted.

Leadership Development

One of the effects of having the three Districts under Mission Enabling Commissions is that we were able to discover more people with leadership potential as opportunities to serve emerged in the districts. To add to that, several of our members have played significant roles in the denomination as well as in ecumenical organizations.

INTENTION

Considering the above, the Presbytery of Zimbabwe decided at its meeting in September 2025 to work towards establishing a Synod with multiple Presbyteries in Zimbabwe. The establishment of a Synod would ensure that the UPCS has a platform to speak with one voice in the country while the various Presbyteries do the necessary work of serving and overseeing local congregations. The following is the Extract from the Minutes of the Presbytery meeting on 27 September 2025 at Highfield Presbyterian Church:

1. Presbytery resolves to petition the General Assembly for the constitution of the Synod of Zimbabwe at the end of 2027. **Seconded and agreed**
2. Appoint a Synod establishment Committee at this 27th September meeting and give it the following terms. (Names of the Committee members to be presented at the next Council meeting.)
 - i) to review the current Mission Enabling Commissions and assess if they can be turned into Presbyteries.
 - ii) After reviewing Mission Enabling Commissions, draft boundaries for Presbyteries that will make up the Synod.
 - iii) Report and make recommendations to the 2026 February Administrative Council meeting.
3. Ensure that the necessary steps are taken for the General Assembly Executive Commission in 2026 to be appraised on the process to ensure the timely constitution of the Synod Zimbabwe. **Seconded and agreed**

PROPOSAL:

- 1. The Executive Commission notes the intention of the Presbytery of Zimbabwe to divide multiple Presbyteries and thereafter form a national Synod.**

CHURCH OFFICE & HR COMMITTEE OF GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Supplementary Report to the Executive Commission 2026

The COHRC is submitting this Supplementary Report due to the timing related to the search and appointment process for a new Clerk of Assembly. This report deals with the procedures followed in discerning a candidate called to this position. The name of this candidate will be revealed only when this report is presented to the Executive Commission on Saturday 13 June 2026.

Thanks to the incumbent

The Committee wishes to place on record its appreciation to the **Rev Vusi Mkhungo** for what will be a term of eleven years as Clerk of the General Assembly by the time his tenure ends on **30 September 2026**. The Rev Mkhungo was due to complete his service at the Central Office on 30 September 2025 when the COHRC decided to propose a change in the Job Specification of the Clerk of Assembly – from full-time to part-time. This proposal was rejected by the General Assembly in 2025, necessitating the extension of the present Clerk's appointment for an additional year.

The search for Equity and a timeline for the process

Since October 2023, the committee has followed a policy to address work opportunities for both youth and gender equity in the Central Office. Through its Equity Task team, the committee has taken steps to encourage women and younger candidates to apply for positions offered.

At its April 2025 meeting, the HR Task Team circulated a **draft timeline** for recruitment of a Clerk of Assembly emphasizing the need for a strategy to recruit women to this position. It was pointed out that an advertisement for the position of Clerk of Assembly legally could not specify age, gender, religion, or race but that a preference for women was acceptable.

Advertising the Position & Receiving Applications

The position was advertised on **25 August 2025** and again on **24 November 2025** with a closing date for applications of **28 February 2026**. Since the position required applicants to be either Ministers or Elders of the UPCS (according to the *Manual of Faith and Order*), the committee considered ways in which women serving in these roles might be encouraged to apply.

The Equity Task Team requested that the advert be circulated through the communications channels of the **Women in Ministry** and the **Fellowship of Women**. Over the months between the release of the advert and the closing date, numerous women who had served or were serving in positions of Clerk of Presbytery were personally contacted with the request that they apply for the position.

At the closing date, **7 applications** had been received, **only 1 from a woman applicant**.

Shortlisting of Candidates for Interviews

According to the timeline and process agreed by the Church Office Committee and in a similar pattern as had been used for the selection of the General Secretary the previous year, the HR Task Team began considering each application received by determining whether each met the criteria outlined in the advert for the position.

On **10 March 2026**, the Task Team met and shortlisted four male applicants and the one female applicant for preliminary online interviews. The candidates were informed of the outcomes of this first stage. The remaining five candidates were interviewed by a representative interview panel of five (comprising two men and two women members of the COHRC plus the Convener of the Assembly Business Committee as representative of the Clerk's main reporting committee) on **Wednesday 8 and Thursday 9 April 2026**.

with the Panel using a standardized four-point rating system and these were conducted remotely (online) to reduce costs. The panel was in consensus about inviting three of the five candidates (including one woman) to participate in psychometric exercises and final interviews.

All candidates were informed of the outcome of this phase of the Interviewing process.

Psychometric Tests & Selection of Top Candidate

Invitations were issued and responded to by the three remaining candidates, after which Dr Inette Taylor conducted the exercises with all three candidates individually on three separate days (**Tuesday 21, Thursday 23 and 24 April 2026**). This process was extremely helpful in uncovering various elements that helped to identify the capacity of each candidate in meeting the requirements of the position. In the afternoon, after each candidate had completed the psychometric exercises, the panel met to interview the candidates. Consensus was reached on the candidate of choice.

COHRC Approval of Recommended Candidate

The interview team reported to the COHRC at a **Special meeting on Tuesday 5 May 2026** with its recommendation. The process and choice of candidate was approved, and permission was granted for name of the candidate to be presented to Executive Commission in June. It was agreed this person should be approached with a conditional financial offer about the position for provisional acceptance or rejection dependent upon the decision of ExCom. This has been done and the candidate has provisionally accepted.

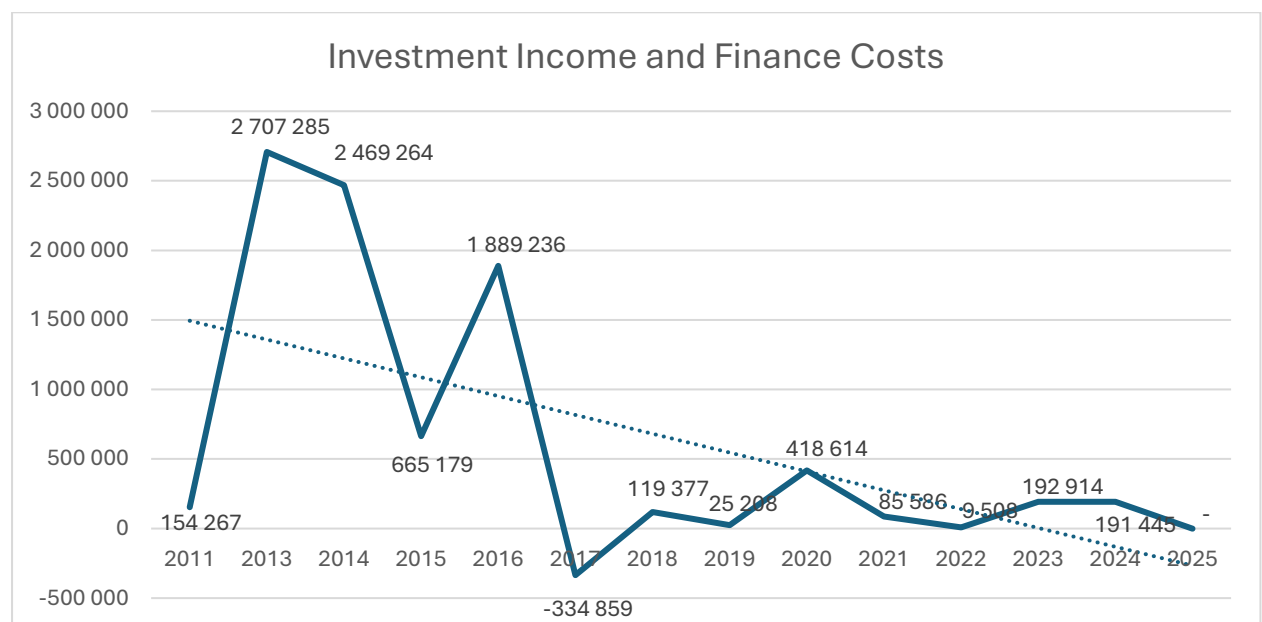
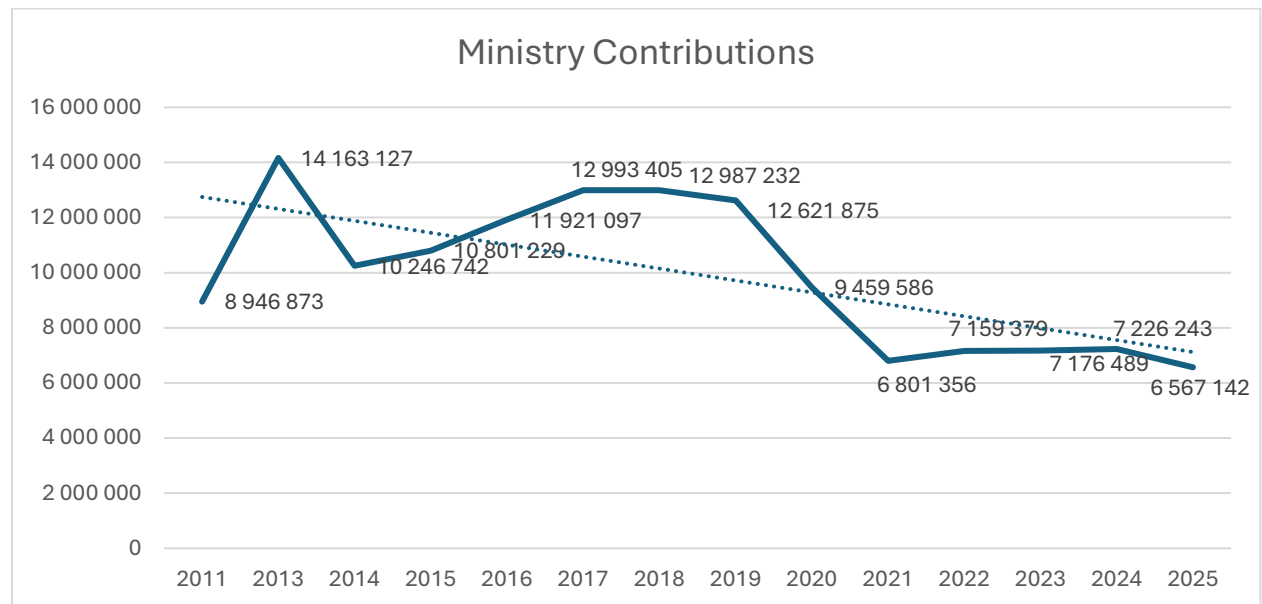

1. Significant accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis except for the revaluation of certain non-current assets and financial instruments. The principal accounting policies are set out below.

1.2 Property, plant and equipment

Land and buildings held for use in the production or supply of goods or services, or for administrative purposes, are stated in the statement of financial position at their original cost, less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

Properties in the course of construction for production, rental or administrative purposes, or for purposes not yet determined, are carried at cost, less any recognised impairment loss. Cost includes professional fees and, for qualifying assets, borrowing costs capitalised in accordance with the company's accounting policy. Depreciation of these assets, on the same basis as other property assets, commences when the assets are ready for their intended use.

Freehold land is not depreciated.

Depreciation is charged so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets, other than freehold land and properties under construction, over their estimated useful lives, using the straight-line basis. The estimated useful lives, residual values and depreciation methods are reviewed at each year end, with the effect of any changes in estimate accounted for on a prospective basis.

Depreciation is provided on all property, plant and equipment other than freehold land, to write down the cost, less residual value, by equal instalments over their useful lives as follows:

Item	Useful life
Buildings	50 years
Plant and equipment	5 years
Office equipment	5 years

Assets held under finance leases are depreciated over their expected useful lives on the same basis as owned assets or, where shorter, the term of the relevant lease.

The gain or loss arising on the disposal or retirement of an item of property, plant and equipment is determined as the difference between the sales proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and is recognised in profit or loss.

1.3 Investment property

Investment property, which is property held to earn rentals and/or for capital appreciation, is measured initially at its cost, including transaction costs. Subsequent to initial recognition, investment property is measured at fair value. Gains and losses arising from changes in the fair value of investment property are included in profit or loss in the period in which they arise.

1.4 Financial assets

Investments are recognised and derecognised on trade date where the purchase or sale of an investment is under a contract whose terms require delivery of the investment within the time frame established by the market concerned, and are initially measured at fair value, plus transaction costs, except for those financial assets classified as at fair value through profit or loss, which are initially measured at fair value.

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Financial assets are classified into the following specified categories: financial assets at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL), 'held to maturity' investments, 'available for sale' (AFS) financial assets and 'loans and receivables'. The classification depends on the nature and purpose of the financial assets and is determined at the time of initial recognition.

Effective interest method

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and of allocating interest revenue over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts (including all fees on points paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life of the financial asset, or where appropriate, a shorter period.

Revenue is recognised on an effective interest basis for debt instruments other than those financial assets designated as at FVTPL.

1.4.1 Financial assets at FVTPL

Financial assets are classified as at FVTPL where the financial asset is either held for trading or it is designated as at FVTPL.

A financial asset is classified as held for trading if:

- * it has been acquired principally for the purpose of selling in the near future; or
- * It is a part of an identified portfolio of financial instruments that the entity manages together and has a recent actual pattern of short-term profit-taking; or
- * It is a derivative that is not designated and effective as a hedging instrument.

A financial asset other than a financial asset held for trading may be designated as at FVTPL upon initial recognition if:

- * such designation eliminates or significantly reduces a measurement or recognition inconsistency that would otherwise arise; or
- * the financial assets forms part of a group of financial assets or financial liabilities or both, which is managed and its performance is evaluated on a fair value basis, in accordance with the entity's documented risk management or investment strategy, and information about the grouping is provided internally on that basis; or
- * it forms part of a contract containing one or more embedded derivatives, and IAS 39 *Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement* permits the entire combined contract (asset or liability) to be designated as at FVTPL.

Financial assets at FVTPL are stated at fair value, with any resultant gain or loss recognised in profit or loss. The net gain or loss recognised in profit or loss incorporates any dividend or interest earned on the financial asset. Fair value is determined in the manner described.

1.5 Loans and receivables

Trade receivables, loans and other receivables that have fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market are classified as loans and receivables. Loans and receivables are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment. Interest revenue is recognised by applying the effective interest rate, except for short-term receivables when the recognition of interest would be immaterial.

1.6 Taxation

There is no provision for taxation as the trust is a registered Public Benefit Organisation and enjoys tax exempt status in terms of Section 10(1) of the Income Tax Act.

1.7 Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the entity has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that the entity will be required to settle the obligation, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

The amount recognised as a provision is the best estimate of the consideration required to settle the present obligation at the reporting date, taking into account the risks and uncertainties surrounding the obligation. Where a provision is measured using the cash flows estimated to settle the present obligation, its carrying amount is the present value of those cash flows.

When some or all of the economic benefits required to settle a provision are expected to be recovered from a third party, the receivable is recognised as an asset if it is virtually certain that reimbursement will be received and the amount of the receivable can be measured reliably.

1.8 Revenue recognition

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable. Revenue is reduced for value added tax, estimated customer returns, rebates and other similar allowances.

1.8.1 Rendering of services

Revenue from a contract to provide services is recognised by reference to the stage of completion of the contract. The stage of completion of the contract is determined as follows:

* Servicing fees included in the price of products sold are recognised by reference to the proportion of the total service cost of providing the servicing for the product sold, taking into account historical trends in the number of services actually provided on past goods sold; and

1.8.2 Dividend and interest revenue

Dividend revenue from investments is recognised when the shareholder's right to receive payment has been established.

Interest revenue is accrued on a time basis, by reference to the principal outstanding and at the effective interest rate applicable, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to that asset's net carrying amount.

Annual Trustee Report to the Executive Commission (2026)

The report has been prepared for submission to the Executive Commission of UPCS. We wish to update you on what has transpired with the Pension Fund over the last year. The Fund is only accessible to members of the UPCS in South Africa.

Trustees

The term of office of the Trustees serving on the Board ended on 31 December 2025. The composition of the Board of Trustees from 1 January 2026, following the appointment and election of Trustees, is as follows:

Membership

- As at 31 January 2026, the Fund had 172 contributing members, 42 unclaimed benefits, 25 deferred beneficiaries, 34 paid-up members, 8 preserved members (members who became paid-up after the introduction of the Default Regulations) and 9 pensioners paid directly by the Fund.
- The administration and payment of monthly pensions to the majority of pensioners was moved from the Fund to Momentum in October 2024.

Statutory compliance

The Board of Trustees is currently constituted correctly in terms of the Fund's rules. The Fund currently complies with all statutory requirements.

Changes to the Fund's investment strategy

The Board agreed to change the Fund's investment strategy from 1 March 2026 as follows:

Long Term Portfolio (CPI +5% portfolio)

1. Implement a portfolio with a CPI +5% pa return objective (Long Term Portfolio) as the default investment portfolio for members who are 5 years and longer from retirement.
2. Terminate Consolidator Portfolio and switch the assets to the Long-Term Portfolio.
3. Underlying investment portfolio structure changes from a multi-manager portfolio to a combination of full discretionary, multi-asset class investment portfolios (global balanced funds), managed by a combination of reputable asset managers with complementary investment styles.
4. Invest the Long Term Portfolio in the following portfolios:

Manager	Allocation
Allan Gray Global Balanced	25%
Coronation Global Balanced	40%
Ninety-One Global Balanced	35%
Total	100%

5. Long Term Portfolio to be held and administered on the Alexander Forbes Investments (AFI) balance sheet. AFI performs investment administration and legal compliance services (unitisation, consolidated reporting, regulatory reporting, audit certificates, portfolio rebalancing, etc).

Stable Portfolio (CPI + 3% pa)

1. Change the lifestage de-risking portfolio from the current money market portfolio to the Stable Portfolio.
2. Portfolio structure is a combination of absolute return portfolios managed by reputable asset managers.
3. Invest the Stable Portfolio in the following investment portfolios:

Manager	Allocation
Abax Absolute Return	50%
Coronation Absolute Return	50%
Total	100%

Money Market Portfolio

1. Retain the money market portfolio as an investment option for members.
2. Utilise the AFI Banker Portfolio as underlying investment portfolio for the money market option.

Annual financial statements

The audit of the annual financial statements as of 31 December 2024 were finalised and submitted to the Financial Services Conduct Authority (FSCA). The 31 December 2025 audited annual financial statements will be presented to the Board in June 2025 and are on track to be submitted to the FSCA by 30 June 2026, within the legislated submission period of 6 months after year end.

Actuarial Valuation

The statutory actuarial valuation report as at 31 December 2022 was finalised and submitted to the FSCA on 27 November 2023 within the legislated submission period of 12 months after year end. The 31 December 2025 statutory actuarial valuation report will be presented to the Trustees in the third quarter of 2026.

Rate of Contributions with effect from 1 February 2026

Ministers:

- Member: 7.5% of Stipend
- Congregation: R 2,900 or R 2,080 (subject to being recognised as a Congregation B member).

➤ In order for a Congregation to be recognised as a Congregation B, the Congregation must be approved by the Presbytery responsible for the Congregation before 1 January of each calendar year.

Staff Members (joining after 1 July 2015):

- Member: 7.5% of Pensionable Salary
- Congregation: R2,080 (inclusive of administration and risk benefit costs).

Fund Rule Amendments

No rule amendments have been made since the previous report.

Rule amendment number 15, which removes the Defined Benefit (DB) liabilities by moving the DB members onto the Defined Contribution (DC) structure within the Fund and provides relief to Distressed Congregations who are unable to generate sufficient income to pay the Minister a salary in full has not been registered by the FSCA. The Fund is liaising with the FSCA and has provided the actuarial information requested by the FSCA to register the amendment.

Investments

The returns from the investment portfolios as at 28 February 2026 (net of fees) were as follows:

- o Coldstream Consolidator portfolio:
13.3% over one year
14.13% per annum over three years
12.54% per annum over five years
- o Coldstream Money Market portfolio:
8.51% over one year
8.80% per annum over three years
7.35% per annum over five years

Pensioner Benefits

Monthly pensions were increased by 3.59% effective 1 January 2026. The pensioners also received a bonus in December 2025 equal to a 13th cheque.

Responsibility of members to plan for their retirement

The Trustees cannot emphasise strongly enough the need for members to seek appropriate independent financial advice and prepare adequately for their retirement.

Members nearing retirement are encouraged to utilise the individual retirement benefit counselling sessions provided by the Fund's Principal Officer that is available at no cost.

The individual benefit counselling sessions have been made available by the Trustees of the Fund to assist members with their retirement planning. The sessions are not intended to provide members with personal financial advice or recommend a course of action to be taken by members. The purpose of the sessions is to provide members with information and guidance to help them make informed decisions regarding their retirement.

Supplementary Report to Executive Commission 2026

1. Introduction

This report is intended as a supplement to the main report published in the Papers for Executive Commission 2026. The Commission met online on 25 May 2026 in addition to the previously mentioned dates.

2. Additional Matters that were discussed during this period

2.1 Request for a Commission by the JH Soga Memorial Synod

At the ASC meeting held on 25 May 2026, the mediators (the Rev Charles Bosiki and Mrs Nobuntu Pona) reported that their endeavours had been unsuccessful. The ASC discharged the mediation team with thanks and agreed to refer the matter for judicial intervention.

2.2 Special Commission of General Assembly: St Andrew's Henley on Klip and St Peter's United, Secunda

The ASC received a report from the Special Commission appointed to investigate a possible unsatisfactory state of the congregations of St Andrew's, Henly on Klip, in Lekoa Presbytery and St Peter's United Church, Secunda, in Highveld Presbytery and the ministry of the Rev. Dr. Scott Silver in his role as minister to both.

The Interim report of that Special Commission is attached as Appendix B for noting.

2.3 Matters that are ongoing and in process

The ASC has received progress reports in regard to the following matters and they are in process but as yet incomplete:

- (a) An engagement by mediators in the Central Cape Presbytery regarding unhappiness in relations between ministers.
- (b) A mediation in the Presbytery of Zimbabwe between the Presbytery and the Zimbabwe Schools Trust.
- (c) A mediation concerning the Glenbain Congregation, its minister, and the Presbytery of Drakensberg.

The Assembly Standing Commission submits this supplementary report so as to keep the Executive Commission closely informed about its work.

The Uniting Presbyterian Church in Southern Africa

Special Commission to St Andrew's, Henley-on-Klip, and St Peter's United, Secunda

1. Mandate and Composition

The Assembly Standing Commission appointed this Special Commission in terms of paragraph 10.41(e), read with paragraph 14.43 of the *Manual of Faith and Order*, and vested it with the powers of the General Assembly to act. The Commission is required to report to each meeting of the ASC and to submit a final report to the General Assembly in 2027. Its mandate is to determine whether an unsatisfactory state exists at St Andrew's, Henley-on-Klip, in the Presbytery of Lekoa, and at St Peter's United Church, Secunda, in the Presbytery of Highveld, both under the ministry of the Rev Dr Scott Silver. The ASC appointed the Rev Dr Peter Langerman as Moderator of the Special Commission, the Clerk of Assembly as Clerk and the Rev Melanie Cook and Elder Robin Twaddle as Commissioners.

2. Meetings of the Special Commission

The Special Commission met on 26 January, 11 March and 5 May 2026. In the last instance, it engaged with representatives of the Lekoa Presbytery and with Dr Silver to review the history of the matter and to explore the possibility of a negotiated resolution. Following discussion, the Commission proposed a conditional settlement, which Dr Silver initially accepted for further consideration. The proposal was designed to address both ministerial placement and legal issues in a manner that might reduce conflict and avoid prolonged litigation.

The terms of the proposed settlement were that Dr Silver would resign freely and voluntarily from the pastoral charge of St Andrew's, Henley-on-Klip; make a realistic attempt to restore relations with the congregation and the Lekoa Presbytery; and take up the appointment at St Peter's United Church, Secunda. In return, the Commission would support his transfer from the care and discipline of the Presbytery of Lekoa to the Presbytery of Highveld, encourage both Presbyteries to support that move, and suspend pending legal action, including steps to reclaim land allegedly "gifted" to him in lieu of outstanding stipend payments.

Dr Silver accepted the proposal in principle and requested ten days in which to discuss it with the two congregations. The Convenor informed the Moderators of the Presbyteries of Lekoa and Highveld, both of whom indicated that they would place the proposal before their respective Presbyteries if it were presented in that form.

On the date by which he had undertaken to respond, he indicated that he would not be in a position to resign from St Andrew's and take up the appointment at St Peter's. The Convenor explained the consequences of that decision, and Dr Silver indicated that he understood them.

3. The way forward

The Commission accordingly met again on 20 May 2026 to consider its response to this development. The Commission's preliminary findings indicate serious concerns about governance, property administration, denominational accountability, and ministerial compliance. These include possible unauthorised dealings with church property, the apparent absence of a functioning Session at St Andrew's, unlawful attempts to disassociate from the Presbytery of Lekoa, refusal to cooperate with Presbytery processes, repeated non-cooperation by Dr Silver, and his service across two Presbyteries without proper appointment.

These matters create substantial institutional, legal, financial, and pastoral risks, including possible property loss, litigation costs, weakened church governance, and further

deterioration of trust. The Commission has therefore resolved to proceed with a formal congregational visit and investigation at St Andrew's on 5 July 2026, maintain its legal position, prepare for possible disciplinary proceedings, and continue coordinating with the Presbyteries of Lekoa and Highveld. The matter remains unresolved and requires decisive action to restore proper order, accountability, and compliance.

Supplementary Report to the Executive Commission 2026

Gender Desk (Church in Society Committee)

The Gender Desk wishes to report to the Executive Commission and to reaffirm that it continues to function as a task team under the Church in Society Committee of the General Assembly, where it has been situated for some time. We note, however, that the Gender Desk has not been consistently included in the ongoing work and processes of the Committee, and we express a desire for more intentional integration going forward.

The Gender Desk has experienced a number of internal challenges over the past year, particularly with regard to membership capacity and the availability of members to devote sufficient time to this important work. As a result, we regret that during the last quarter of 2025 we were unable to host our usual events and programmes. We sincerely apologise for this lapse. At the same time, we wish to affirm our renewed commitment to the mandate of the Gender Desk, and we are in the process of planning to resume and strengthen our programme of activities in the coming year.

In March 2026, the Gender Desk convened a meeting with Presbytery representatives. This gathering provided a valuable opportunity to listen and to discern what is currently taking place within Presbyteries, as well as to hear directly from representatives about the kinds of support, resources, and initiatives they would find most helpful from the Gender Desk at a denominational level. This engagement has been an important step in reconnecting and ensuring that our work is responsive to the lived realities within the Church.

The Gender Desk has also joined the task team responsible for planning the celebration of 50 years of the ordination of women within the denomination. We are grateful for the opportunity to contribute to this significant milestone. While we look forward to celebrating this important achievement, we are equally mindful of the ongoing challenges faced by women in ministry and leadership, and we see this moment as both celebratory and reflective.

The Gender Desk remains committed to promoting justice, inclusion, and the full participation of all within the life of the Church, and we look forward to strengthening our contribution in the year ahead.

Supplementary Report to the Executive Commission 2026

MINISTERS' TRAVEL ALLOWANCE SOUTH AFRICA

The Ministers' Consultation scheduled for April 2026 was duly convened. Regrettably, the General Treasurer was unable to participate owing to prior professional commitments. A follow-up engagement was subsequently arranged, during which the General Treasurer made a comprehensive presentation to the Ministers of the UPCS. The presentation was well received and facilitated constructive dialogue on this important matter.

The Ministry Committee respectfully requests the Executive Commission to grant additional time for further consultation with Ministers, the Finance Committee, and other relevant stakeholders. Such consultation is necessary to ensure that any proposed implementation is both fiscally responsible and pastorally sensitive, safeguarding the long-term welfare of Ministers, particularly with regard to retirement provisions and compliance with the requirements of the South African Revenue Service (SARS).

The Committee remains committed to pursuing a solution that reflects the Church's responsibility to exercise faithful stewardship of its resources while ensuring just and equitable care for those who are called to the ministry of Word and Sacrament.

DISCERNMENT CONFERENCE

At the time of preparing this report, the Discernment Conference was scheduled to take place from 3–5 June 2026. As the deadline for the submission of supplementary papers falls on 29 May 2026, the Ministry Committee is unable to include the outcomes of the Conference within the prescribed reporting period.

The Committee therefore respectfully requests the indulgence of the Moderator to permit the Convener to present a verbal report on the proceedings and outcomes of the Discernment Conference from the floor of the Executive Commission for information and noting.

The Ministry Committee believes that the discernment and formation of those who seek to serve the Church in ordained ministry is a sacred responsibility entrusted to the courts of the Church. It is therefore important that the Executive Commission be apprised of the outcomes of this process at the earliest opportunity.

OVERTURE FROM CENTRAL CAPE PRESBYTERY

The Ministry Committee once again finds itself compelled to respond to an overture concerning the recognition of the South African Theological Seminary (SATS) as an approved institution for ministerial formation within the UPCS.

The Committee wishes to remind the Executive Commission that this matter has repeatedly come before both the General Assembly and the Executive Commission since 2016. On each occasion, the Church has carefully considered the proposal and has resolved not to recognise SATS as an approved institution for ministerial formation. These decisions were reached following thorough deliberation and were supported by substantial and well-reasoned grounds.

The Ministry Committee respectfully raises the question of ecclesiastical finality. There comes a point at which the courts of the Church must recognise that a matter has been adequately considered and decisively determined. Continually revisiting issues upon which the Church has repeatedly pronounced risks undermining the authority, integrity, and orderly governance of the councils of the Church.

In this regard, the Committee submits that the present overture effectively seeks to overturn previous decisions of the General Assembly without a substantive basis for reconsideration. Such an approach is inconsistent with the principles of Presbyterian polity and orderly church governance.

The Committee draws the attention of the Executive Commission to the provisions of the Manual of Faith and Order:

14.17(c) *"An Executive may not rescind decisions of a full Council, unless the Council grants permission to its own Executive to rescind decisions of the full Council. A Council may rescind decisions of its Executive."*

The Ministry Committee is not aware of any proposal before the General Assembly to rescind its previous decisions regarding this matter. Consequently, the Committee submits that it would be inappropriate for the Executive Commission to entertain an overture that seeks, either directly or indirectly, to reverse a decision of the General Assembly.

Accordingly, the Ministry Committee recommends that the Executive Commission pass from the matter. Furthermore, the Committee recommends that the Executive Commission affirm the existing position of the Church and pastorally advise the overturning body that this matter has been conclusively addressed by the courts of the Church and should not be repeatedly resubmitted without compelling new grounds.

The reasons for declining recognition of SATS have been comprehensively articulated in previous deliberations of the Church, including those of 2016, 2018, and 2025. As there have been no material changes warranting reconsideration, the Committee does not deem it necessary to restate those arguments in the present report.

The Ministry Committee remains satisfied that the UPCSA continues to have access to sufficient recognised institutions of higher learning capable of providing theological education and ministerial formation consistent with the doctrinal standards, ecclesiology, and ministerial requirements of the Church.

The Ministry Committee wishes to draw the attention of the Executive Commission to the fact that the determination and approval of institutions of higher learning for the purposes of ministerial formation fall within the mandate entrusted to the Ministry Committee under Chapter 17 of the Manual of Faith and Order.

The Committee is of the view that this overture represents an attempt, whether directly or indirectly, to alter the provisions and intent of Chapter 17 by transferring or circumventing the authority vested in the Ministry Committee regarding the discernment and approval of theological institutions. Such a proposal would constitute a significant departure from the established polity of the UPCSA and the carefully ordered processes by which the Church oversees the formation of candidates for the holy ministry.

The Ministry Committee therefore submits that the Executive Commission ought not to entertain this overture, as doing so would undermine the constitutional responsibilities assigned to the Committee and compromise the integrity of the Church's governance structures. The Presbyterian tradition affirms that authority is exercised through properly constituted councils and committees acting within their prescribed mandates. To depart from this principle would create an undesirable precedent and erode the good order upon which the life and witness of the Church depend.

Accordingly, the Committee respectfully recommends that the Executive Commission reaffirm the existing provisions of Chapter 17 and decline to proceed with any proposal that seeks to alter, bypass, or diminish the authority entrusted to the Ministry Committee in matters pertaining to ministerial formation and the recognition of institutions of higher learning.

17.22”The Committee prescribes the course of studies that each Candidate whom it selects will follow and the institution at which he/she will study. The course of studies is for a degree, or at least a diploma, in theology from institutions recognized by the UPCSА.

The Ministry Committee submits that recommendations concerning the recognition of institutions of higher learning should properly originate from the body entrusted by the Church with the responsibility for ministerial formation and theological education. Such recommendations must be the product of careful, rigorous, and comprehensive research, taking into account academic standards, ministerial formation, denominational needs, ecclesiological compatibility, financial implications, and the long-term interests of the UPCSА.

Having undertaken such due diligence, the Ministry Committee is then able to bring informed recommendations to the General Assembly for consideration and decision. This process preserves the integrity of the Church's governance structures and ensures that decisions affecting the formation of future Ministers are made on the basis of thorough discernment and responsible stewardship.

The Committee is therefore concerned that it should not be placed in a position where it is effectively compelled to defend repeatedly a matter on which it has already conducted extensive research and submitted comprehensive reports to the councils of the Church. In the case of SATS, the Ministry Committee has, on several occasions, presented detailed reasons for its recommendation that the institution not be recognised for the purposes of ministerial formation within the UPCSА. Those recommendations have been considered and affirmed by the appropriate councils of the Church.

To revisit the matter without any substantive new information, material change in circumstances, or fresh evidence capable of altering the Committee's assessment, undermines the work entrusted to the Committee and risks reducing the Church's deliberative processes to recurring debates on matters that have already been thoroughly examined and decided.

The Ministry Committee therefore submits that the Executive Commission should uphold the established processes of the Church, respect the mandate entrusted to the Committee by the General Assembly, and affirm that proposals relating to the recognition of institutions of higher learning ought properly to arise from the considered recommendations of the Ministry Committee following comprehensive investigation and discernment.

PROPOSALS

The Ministry Committee therefore moves:

1. The Executive Commission receives the report. (T)
2. The Executive Commission affirms the existing position of the Church regarding the recognition of institutions of higher learning for the purposes of ministerial formation and theological education. (M)
3. The Executive Commission pastorally advises the Presbytery of Central Cape and the persons bringing the overture that the matter of SATS being recognized as a training institution of the UPCSА has been conclusively addressed by the Councils of the Church and ought not to be repeatedly resubmitted in the absence of compelling new grounds or materially changed circumstances. (M)
4. The Executive Commission reaffirms the mandate of the Ministry Committee, as provided for in Chapter 17 of the *Manual of Faith and Order*, to research, evaluate, and make recommendations to the General Assembly concerning institutions of higher learning utilized for ministerial formation within the UPCSА. (M)
5. The Executive Commission receives and notes the verbal report of the Convener on the outcomes of the 2026 Discernment Conference. (T)

6. The Executive Commission grants the Ministry Committee additional time to undertake further consultation with Ministers, the Finance Committee, and other relevant stakeholders regarding Ministers' Travel Allowance, and that the Committee bring a comprehensive report and recommendations to the 2027 General Assembly. (T)
